Conference Highlights: The conference opens with a Thursday evening reception and musical entertainment held in Room 338 SMC from 7:00 to 9:30 p.m. Music will be provided by PSU's Florestan Trio (Carol Sindell, Hamilton Cheifetz, and Harold Gray) and PSU faculty singers, Ruth Dobson, soprano, and Bruce Browne, tenor. They will perform Songs, Opus 108, of Ludwig van Beethoven. Wine, soft drinks, and cheese will be served. This reception provides a chance to get to know others before the sessions begin. Dr. William Paudler, Dean, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, Portland State University, will welcome conferees.

On **Friday afternoon** Special Session I features a choice of two excellent presentations: Eminent scholar **Leland Roth**, internationally respected architectural historian, and Chair of the Department of Art History, University of Oregon, will present a lecture and slide presentation on "Portland Emerging as a Major Cultural Center in the Nineteenth Century"; and the distinguished **Storefront Theater** will provide a readers' theater presentation of selections from W. B. Yeats's <u>The Cuchulain Cycle</u>.

The reception on **Friday evening** at the Marriott Hotel will provide an opportunity to discuss the day's proceedings and will be followed by

Nancy Armstrong's key-note address. Professor Armstrong is currently with the Departments of English and Comparative Literature at the University of Minnesota. Her interdisciplinary interests are reflected in numerous publications, lectures, and colloquia which bring historical and cultural perspectives to bear on the reading of literature. Her recent Desire and Domestic Fiction: A Political History of the Novel has been praised as "a subtle, original and learned contribution to . . . the rise of the novel," providing insights that are "radically new, lively, and subtle."

The Saturday luncheon will be held in SMC, Room 338, from 12:00 to 1:00. the cost of the luncheon is included in the registration fee. The annual business meeting will follow immediately at 1:00 p.m. On the agenda will be election of officers and decisions about topic, site, and dates of next year's conference.


